## 💄 \$chool's Out—Time to Dive Into a Good Book!



# **Drop Everything and Read (DEAR)**

#### DEAR Time: Embedding a Love of Reading at K\$3

Our half-termly DEAR (Drop Everything and Read) events continue to play a vital role in promoting reading for pleasure across Key Stage 3. These sessions—ranging from focused reading lessons to multi-part storytelling—have become a valued part of our school culture, helping to make reading a regular and enjoyable experience. We've explored a variety of engaging texts, including seasonal themes for Valentine's Day, Easter, and Christmas, as well as thought-provoking short stories like Roald Dahl's *The Landlady* and a motivating extract from *Atomic Habits* by James Clear. Each session offers



students the chance to pause, reflect, and connect with texts in meaningful ways.

# World Book Day Across the Academy



World Book Day itself was a whole-school effort. Staff decorated classroom doors with their favourite books, creating a vibrant display across the academy. We ran various competitions, another author event, and again joined in the "Booky and Footy" quiz. The day helped spotlight reading in a fun and inclusive way.
